



Beef Ambassadors tour AgNext, meet Dr. Matsushima and explore Beef Sticks for Backpacks Facility

CattleWomen and Beef Ambassadors joined together April 25 for a tour to view and hear about the research going on at the Colorado State University (CSU) AgNext complex. Beef ambassadors Paige Bigler, Henry Burk, Alex Grossardt, Kellen Larson, Sage Shy and Mitchell VanDeusen got a firsthand view of current experiments and monitoring of animal and ecosystem health. They were introduced to cattle with cannulas, a surgically installed porthole-like device that allows access to the rumen of a cow to research and analyze the digestive system.

After that tour, ambassadors and cattlewomen met at the CSU Animal Science building and were treated to a private interview with Dr. John Matsushima, renowned agriculture leader whose innovation of steam-flaked corn revolutionized feedlot operations. This was particularly of interest to the group, since all 26 Beef Ambassadors received a copy of the Ag in the Classroom book, *Corn, Cattle and Courage* which highlights Matsushima's life and career.

When the interview concluded, an impromptu tour of the Beefsticks for Backpacks facility took place. CSU Animal Science professor Dr. Bob Delmore led the CCW group through the meats lab providing explanations of the processes and answered questions.

At the conclusion of the day, all agreed the interview and tours were enlightening, educational and extremely fun.



Where Has CBC Been? Connecting with Coloradans Across the State

QUARTER MEMBER SPOTLIGHTS



Northwest Quarter Member Spotlight—Chris Rhyne

Chris Rhyne has been a strong figure in Moffat County CattleWomen since 2007. She and her husband, Greg have been married for 22 years and have two children, Pepper and Jolene. Chris and Greg were both born and raised in Moffat County, only moving away for college and the first couple years of marriage before returning home to raise their family. They currently have a small acreage where they raise and train performance horses for rodeo and roping. They also raise and process their own meat and share a hay operation with another family. Chris works

as a Rangeland Management Specialist. The reason she became a CattleWoman was to share information with people about agriculture. "I think one of the most important things we can do is educate consumers with correct information so they can make choices based on true information about nutrition, natural resources and business operations," Chris says. Her favorite thing about agriculture is community and the support, sharing of information and celebrating success that comes with it. Chris has been a part of an important event that MCCW puts on each year since she was in 4-H in the 90's. 4th Grade Ag Day is a day that we get to teach our youth about Agriculture and where their food and other products come from. Today, Chris spear heads the day and organizes with our six school organizations and all of the presenters and chapter to put on an educational and exciting day for the kids. Chris had the good fortune to be raised on a small ranch and to be involved with 4-H and FFA growing up, but being able to share her knowledge with kids that don't have the same privilege is something that puts a smile on her face each year. Her advice for young cattlewomen is, "Allow people around you to grow. Mentoring and encouraging is a more self-satisfying experience than discontent or conflict."

Northeast Quarter Member Spotlight—Holly Golen

Holly grew up in Larimer County, Colorado, in the Glendevey area, right on the Colorado/ Wyoming border. The family ranch was purchased in 1917 by Holly's grandparents, and sat at 8000 ft above sea level. Their cow/calf ranch ran 375 Angus/Hereford cows, and it was here that Holly developed her love of the beef cattle industry and the ranching way of life. Holly was the 3rd generation on that ranch and recalls how she learned ranching from her father. She would follow him to the calving shed at night, putting her feet in the footprints he left in the snow. She was one of 4 kids on that ranch, and her siblings and she still have a close relationship to this day. Growing up, she learned how to cook, keep house, ride, run equipment, and take care of the cattle; she even trained her own horses. Holly shared that they ran several breeds of bulls (Angus, Hereford, Shorthorn, Galloway) over the years to help reduce their losses to brisket disease. In 2006-07



they chose to reduce their cow herd as the winter weather that year was too harsh to be effective at raising beef cattle. Ranching at 8000' is not easy, and they slowly built their herd back up over the years.

Holly's mother joined the Albany County Cowbelles over 50 years ago, and she followed in suit by becoming a member of the same Cowbelles group in 1980! She was also active in the Wyoming Cattlewomen organization, and the family supported the Larimer County Stockgrowers Association as well. While living in Arvada, she has been active in the Front Range Livestock Association, as well as joining the Mile Hi Cattlewomen's group! For Holly, the Cattlewomen are vital in advocating for the beef industry and educating people on the importance of cattle as a food source and in managing lands appropriately. Holly is passionate about caring for the land and the animals, and sharing that with people in a positive way.

In 1974, Holly married George Golen. They celebrated 50 years together last fall. They met through Holly's sister, as George was a friend of her sister's boyfriend. He asked Holly to go for a ride on his motorcycle...and the rest is history! They have two kids who live in the Denver area. In 2011, Holly and her husband George moved off the ranch to Arvada, Colorado. Holly managed the ranch long-distance until making a very hard decision to sell in 2018. After moving to the Denver area, Holly continued her career as a Brand Inspector. Her father had been a brand inspector for 52 years, and when he retired, they hired Holly! She served the livestock industry for 20 years, and her favorite part was the people she worked with and met, and that she got to pet a horse almost every day.

Holly's hobbies include horses...her horse Flint to be exact, sewing, staying active with her church and helping her community. She is an amazing Cattlewoman and we are lucky to have her in the Mile Hi group!

Southwest Quarter Member Spotlight—Bunny McComb



A hobby of quilting is an understatement when it comes to Bunny McComb's passion, a three-time past President of the Southwest Cowbelles/Cattlewomen which takes in Cortez, Montezuma and Dolores counties, and past Secretary and Historian. She was also CCW Southwest Quarter Representative. She has been involved with the Cowbelles since 1999 and helped over the years with the brand quilts given and raffled every year since joining. She estimates that at least 60 brand quilts have been made since the organization started.

Bunny lives in Cortez with her husband Kevin of 43 years and has two children, son Brine who lives in Cortez, and daughter Bailey who resides in Arizona and 4 grandchildren. She and Kevin have lived on their ranch with cattle and Bunny's small flock of sheep since 1985. Bunny is a retired

Castle Range Goulash

Original recipe from Black Mesa CowBelles, reprinted from the Ladies of the Woman's Society fo Christian Service's 1955 Cookbook

2 lbs. beef shank, cut in 1-inch cubes

3 tbsp flour

½ tsp paprika

2 tsp salt

1tsp sugar

1 onion, chopped

3 tbsp fat

Place above ingredients in paper bag, shake well and roll beef cubes in bag. Brown floured beef cubes in fat with onions.

Cover with:

1 ³/₄ cup beef broth

½ cup sour cream

½ cup tomato juice or soup

Add:

Black pepper to taste

4 to 5 medium carrots

2 cups peas

4 medium potatoes, diced

Cook until vegetables are tender. Add a small can of mushrooms 10 minutes before serving time.

With the younger kids, we made beef eartag necklaces and had activities for the older kids, thanks to supplies from the Colorado Beef Council.

In March, we partnered with ag organizations in Lincoln County to organize a banner fundraiser where ranches and businesses can show their support for agriculture by purchasing an Eat Beef banner to be displayed at several events in the county throughout the summer. Over 170 banners were purchased!

In April, LCCW presented seven agriculture and cattle-themed books donated to the Limon Memorial Library to be circulated in Lincoln County at the Limon Memorial Library, Hugo Public Library and Lincoln County Bookmobile! We featured these books on social media during Beef Fact Fridays. On the same day, LCCW members had the privilege of hearing from the talented Limon FFA team as they prepare for the Ag Issues Forum at their State Convention. Their presentation focused on the implementation of RFID/EID tags in the beef and bison industries—a topic that saw major changes take effect in 2024. These young women did an outstanding job presenting both sides of the issue with professionalism, clarity, and confidence. The future of agriculture is bright with leaders like these stepping up!

In May, we helped sponsor a regional Ag Fest put on by Colorado Extension, where we purchased Beef Sticks for Backpacks to hand out to the kids who came to Ag Fest, along with promoting the program to the schools involved. For May is Beef Month, LCCW partnered with the Limon restaurant, Oscars Bar & Grille, to offer a Prime Rib special. Each Friday and Saturday night in May, Prime Rib was discounted to \$20.99 a plate, first-come-first serve. Not surprisingly, they sold out of prime rib every night! Even if people didn't come for the prime rib, we had table tents on each table with beef facts and a link to LCCW family favorite beef recipes. We also added in a social media contest for people to submit a picture of their beef dinner for a chance to win a \$50 Oscars gift card. This was the fourth time we've partnered with Oscars and it was a great success again!
